

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

As I have driven around town and through the cemetery and park, Mayfield is truly a beautiful place. Unfortunately, we are in an extreme drought. With the snow almost melted and the reservoirs very dry we will not have irrigation water for very long. The dry weather conditions also impact the spring flow to our culinary tanks. We are asking all residents to cut back on exterior water usage. Governor Cox has issued a state of emergency for drought conditions. This declaration indicates that we are asked to use water wisely. We will be providing updates on allowed outside water use as the summer progresses During drought conditions there is an increased danger of yard fires as well as wildfires. Windy conditions contribute to the spread of fires. As town leaders, we have signed an agreement with the Utah State Forestry and Fire Prevention office to help mitigate fire fuels along roads, fences and around city property. In return the state fire office agrees to provide funding to help fight fires that start on land surrounding a local community. We are asking residences to clean up all dead grasses, limbs and trees around your yards and buildings. There are currently ordinances regulating open burn seasons. We will be considering a more complete "Open and Close Burn Ordinance" submitted by our local fire Department. With summer activities, please have an enjoyable time and recreate safely.

Your dog license could be late, and you could be facing late fees! If you did not attend the clinic in April, and you have a dog(s), your dog license is past due. Stop by town hall with your rabies vaccine proof and get your license. Mon-Thur 8:30-4:00 Fee is \$5 for male/spayed female, \$10 for female. If you can't make it during this time, drop your information and fee in the night deposit and we will happily mail your license.

PUBLIC HEARING

June 9th @ 6pm the Council will hear comments from the public about adopting an Open and Close Burn Ordinance which would allow for exceptions on recreational fires, Amending our Cemetery Fees and Ordinance which would allow for 2 cremains in one grave and 1 cremain on top of an existing grave, and increasing non-resident fees. As well, we will hear comments on the Fiscal Year 2022 Budget and certified tax rate and amending the Fiscal Year 2021 Budget. Please note that public comments are moderated. Mayor's Corner We recently celebrated the Memorial Day

Holiday where we honor our loved ones who have preceded us in this life and for whom we are grateful for the legacy they left us. Each headstone provides a remembrance of a single person, some who are known to many and others whose story is quietly remembered by just a few. Some are a remembrance of a life cut short through an accident, a health issue or in the defense of freedom during times of war. Regardless of the circumstances each one has a mother and father who loved them and children who cherish and are grateful for what they were taught. At the center of the cemetery is our memorial to honor those who have served in the defense of freedom. The bronze plaque lists the names of those who we knew of from Mayfield who served in the military. There are 10 names at the top of the plague who lost their lives during their service to the country. Below these 10 names are the names of those who served in each conflict. There is a flag placed at the grave site of each person that we know of who served in the military and is buried in Mayfield Cemetery. At present we have 91 veterans buried in Mayfield. Glade and Zara Faatz and their family have been erecting the flags for over 25 years. For many years they displayed the personal flags that were draped over the veterans' caskets at their funerals. Many a year Glade and Zara have watched the weather and only set up the large flags when they were certain they would not get rained on. Due to the type of fabric and fragility of these personal flags, it has been determined to return these flags to the families and place a small flag at each veteran's grave. Larger flags were purchased and placed at the memorial for those 10 men who lost their lives in conflict. There are many who have contributed to making the cemetery a special place by adding the information booth, the gazebo, the sitting benches, the memorial plaza, bronze plaque, flag poles.
